

### Intersectionality & Privilege

- Intersectionality recognizes that people can be privileged in some ways and definitely not privileged in others.
- There are many different types of privilege, not just skin color privilege, that impact the way people can move through the world or are discriminated against.
- These are all things you are born into, not things you earned, that afford you opportunities others may not have.

### Examples of Privilege

- Citizenship Being born in a wealthy nation affords you certain privileges non-citizens will never access.
- Class Being born into a financially stable family can help guarantee your health, happiness, safety, education, intelligence, and future opportunities.
- **Sexual Orientation** Being born straight affords you privileges that non-straight folks often have to fight for.
- Sex By being born male, you can assume that you can walk through a parking garage without worrying you'll be raped and that a defense attorney will then blame it on what you were wearing.
- Ability By being born able bodied, you probably don't have to plan your life around handicap access, braille, or other special needs.
- Gender By being born cisgendered, you aren't worried that the restroom or locker room you use will invoke public outrage.

# Three Justifications for Supporting Discrimination

- Ego justification: individuals whose self-esteem is threatened are more likely to use stereotypes and act in ways that disadvantage other groups
- Group justification: people who seek to distinguish their own group—their ingroup from other groups—outgroups
- System justification: ideological motivation to justify the status quo and bolster the legitimacy of the existing social order

## Three Justifications for Supporting Discrimination:

- *Ego justification*: individuals whose self-esteem is threatened are more likely to use stereotypes and act in ways that disadvantage other groups
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- **System justification**: ideological motivation to justify the status quo and bolster the legitimacy of the existing social order


